Get ready for a day filled with smokin' hot blues and mouth-watering BBQ at the Blues and Bones Festival on September 23, 2023. This annual festival is back for its 12th year, bringing together the best in Blues music and BBQ cuisine.

The festival will take place at the Calaveras Fairgrounds, with gates opening at 10:30 AM for VIP ticket holders and 11:00 AM for General Admission. Attendees can expect a lineup of talented blues artists from around the country, with performances from The Blood

Brothers (Albert Castiglia and Mike Zito), the Laurie Morvan Band, The



Blues Cartel featuring Jeremy Norris and the Evan Thomas Band. In addition to the music, there will be a variety of food and BBQ vendors offering up their finest slow-cooked meats, sides, and sauces for attendees to enjoy, as well as number of craft vendors.

"We are thrilled to bring the Blues and Bones Festival back to Angels Camp for another year," said festival originator Walt Duval. "This event has become a staple of the Angels Camp community, and we're excited to once again showcase the best in blues music and BBQ cuisine."

Tickets for the Blues and Bones BBQ Festival are on sale now. Children under 12 are free with a paying adult. 
From Julio Covington (SBS Board Member, all-star volunteer, BITS souvenir jewelry designer)

The song is credited to Willie Dixon, but the rooster—a symbol of male sexual potency—strutted his stuff in the blues long before Dixon and Wolf recorded it in 1961. Charlie Patton, Howlin' Wolf's mentor and running buddy in the 1920s, released his "Banty Rooster Blues" in 1929.

"The Red Rooster"/ "Little Red Rooster" has been covered by such disparate artists as Sam Cooke, the Grateful Dead, the Jesus and



Mary Chain, and Bryan Adams. The best-known cover, though, is by the Rolling Stones, recorded in 1964 at Chess Records in Chicago, in homage to Wolf and Dixon. The Stones closely follow Wolf's original, with Brian Jones on slide guitar and Mick Jagger turning in a nuanced vocal with an undertone of sexual menace (not bad for a 21-yearold English boy).




6th Annual Spring Blues Fling! Swabbie's on the River, April 29,

Woo-Hoo, It's All About the IBC!

As our President Sally Katen mentioned, this year marks the return of the SBS to participation in the Blues Foundation's International Blues Challenge, after an absence of years! Following are a review of our IBC Competition, information on upcoming IBC fundraisers and a solicitation for those SBS members who might be interested in attending the event.

And Then There was One: SBS International Blues Challenge Review

By Laurel Coppess Photos by Paul Luscher The International Blues Challenge (IBC), Sacramento version, took place on Sunday afternoon, May 21, 2023. Held at the newly renovated and reopened concert venue The Boardwalk in Orangevale, the audience of 80 to 100 people enjoyed an ohana experience, seated at tables made from repurposed surfboards and surrounded by island-inspired décor. Paper umbrellas were nearly ubiquitous drink garnishes, while a food menu featuring Hawaiian and Polynesian-style comestibles completed the island vibe. While the venue was decidedly tropical, by contrast the music performed by the entrants was of a different flavor, ranging all the way from energetic blues rock to gospel-tinged acoustic.



represent the Sacramento Blues Society at the IBC competition in Memphis and to earn the \$1,000 in sponsorship money to be used for that purpose.

First to take the stage

With the original number of four contest entrants having dwindled to two by show time, it was decided by the powers that be to have those two remaining acts compete head-tohead for the chance to





was the Angel Reyes Band. A four-piece group consisting of guitaristvocalists Angel Reyes and Tim Barnes, backed by the driving rhythms of Dwayne O'Neal on

bass and Pat Balcom (aka Rat-a-tat Pat) on drums, they hit it hard from the get-go. Following the rules set by the IBC, they were given a maximum allotted time of 20 minutes in which they were expected to perform five to six songs, with higher scoring potential available for original material



as compared to tunes written, recorded, or performed by others. Surrounded by fog machines and stage lighting effects, the band delivered a vigorous performance which the audience rewarded by clapping enthusiastically at the conclusion of each song. With the exception of announcing the titles of their songs, plus a single interlude necessitated by the need to tune a guitar, the band kept spoken communication to a minimum, preferring to let their instru-

ments and song vocals do the talking. Following this strategy, they deftly delivered a high-energy set within their allotted time frame.

Kyle Rowland, then took the stage as the remaining competitor. Performing as a solo act in which he played both guitar and harmonica as well





as the vocals, Kyle delivered a heartfelt, off-the-cuff performance that included several of his own originals. Playing a resonator guitar and at times using a slide, he deftly transitioned between blowing harmonica and rendering vocals. Taking much more of a conversational style than the previous group, Kyle gave the background stories on his originals as well as inviting

the audience to participate in singing along on some of his tunes.

At the conclusion of Kyle's performance, Liz Walker, SBS member and event emcee, took the stage to entertain and enlighten the crowd about the selection





process while the judges awarded their final points and tabulated their scores. After a short, suspenseful period during which the crowd anxiously awaited the results, Liz's

announcement that Kyle Rowland would be our SBS representative was greeted with tremendous applause.

The IBC competition will take place on Beale Street in Memphis, Tennessee January 20 - 24, 2024.

Reached by phone after the competition, Kyle stated that while he

was looking forward to seeing friends both old and new in Memphis and eating some really good barbeque, his biggest goal by far was to go beyond the potential for individual accolades to ensure that other areas of the country, and in fact the entire world, were clued in to the fact that there is a thriving blues scene here in Sacramento, California.

Congratulations and best of luck in Memphis, Kyle Rowland!

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Fantastic Negrito at Harlow's

This three-time Grammy winner for Best Contemporary Blues album (2017, 2019 & 2021) who hails from Oakland, blew me away! I've long wanted to see him perform but never had the opportunity until May 9, when he performed at Harlow's Night Club in Sacramento. WOW. WOW. WOW. I'm hooked!

Negrito called the three shows pulled together quickly (Santa Cruz,

Sonoma, Sacramento) "emergency shows" to get experience with his band as Bruce Springsteen had recently asked him to be the opening act on Springsteen's European tour. And man, he is more than ready! He might very well outshine Springsteen. Seriously, he's that damn good.

Once Negrito hit the stage, he delivered songs from his previous four records as well as his most recent, *White Jesus Black Problems*, a



concept album released in 2022. Inspired by a search into his ancestry, he discovered

his ancestry, he discovered that his seventh generation grandmother was a Scottish indentured servant who entered into common law marriage with an African-American enslaved man, in open defiance of the racist laws of 1750s colonial Virginia. Heavy music content about standing up to inhumanity and brutality with love as your only weapon. Genius. This man is a genius.

Negrito stayed on stage for several hours and the performance was riveting. No encore but what was there left for him to sing or say? He had said and done it all.

After leaving the stage he hurried over to his merch table to smile, converse and sign autographs for the many fans in attendance. He took a few minutes to talk with yours truly, and I was enthralled. Yeah, I would have run away with him after his performance if he'd asked me to! It's ok to laugh, I did when I realized what I was thinking. If you missed this show...well, you missed a great one. An absolutely FANTASTIC show by FANTASTIC NEGRITO.

April 30, 2023 - The Evan Thomas Band

They dished out solid sets of great blues that had the crowd on their feet dancing from start of show to the last notes of the final song.

A Casual Conversation with Bernard

Allison by Barbara Katen

Just imagine my delight when Bernard Allison agreed to be interviewed for the *Blue Notes* ahead of his upcoming Sacramento Blues Society appearance at Harlow's on August 24! Actually, delight is an understatement. Ecstatic would be more accurate. And I would be remiss if I didn't give credit to Mindy



Giles for not only securing Bernard for the August show but also for hooking me up with Bernard so I could ask for the interview. Before reading on, let me just say this Bernard Allison is "da bomb", tickets for the show are on sale now and you really don't want to miss this opportunity to see him LIVE. OK, and away we go!

Blue Notes (BN): Your father, Luther Allison, was an important figure in Chicago blues. Sometimes a son or daughter will choose not to follow in a parent's footsteps. What drew you to playing music?

Bernard Allison (BA): My dad actually didn't want me to follow in his footsteps. He didn't want me to go through the struggles he had. But I wanted to accept the challenge and play music like my dad.

BN: Who other than your father, was a career role model in your youth?

BA: Koko Taylor. I credit her for teaching me how to back up someone, as well as teaching me life on the road.

BN: What was it like being around colorful figures such as Muddy Waters, Albert King, Hound Dog Taylor, and Bobby Rush as a youngster? Any stories you can share?

BA: Bobby Rush is my godfather! He and my mom grew up together in Mississippi. He played bass guitar in my dad's band in the 60s. He also introduced my parents! My dad was very focused on the music and Bobby told my mom "The only way to get his attention is to take his guitar," which she did, and he had to go to her house to get it back. So that's where it all began for my parents.

BN: How did Johnny Winter and Stevie Ray Vaughan impact your musical approach?

BA: Both Stevie & Johnny were like family and good friends of my dad. Johnny taught me how to play open tuning slide guitar and Stevie taught me to not try copying others. For example, "If you like Albert King, find yourself within rather than copy him".

BN: What was it like being in Koko Taylor's band? What did she teach you, if anything, about being a performer? What exactly does the job of being a bandleader entail?

BA: I basically answered that previously. Being a bandleader consists of rehearsing the band, creating arrangements to the liking of the main artist.

BN: You've forged your own musical style over the years. Did you have any specific goals in mind as you built your approach?

BA: I just had the mindset to progress as a guitarist & vocalist learning from the roots. And with age they both become more mature with time.

BN: A favorite early track by you is your version of "Voodoo Chile." How did you manage to make a song closely identified with Jimi Hendrix and Stevie Ray Vaughan sound so uniquely your own?

BA: I actually thought it was an SRV song. LOL. I never really listened to Hendrix prior to Stevie. I asked him how he came up with the song and he replied "That's not my song. It's a Jimi Hendrix song. I just play it how I feel it." So, I also play it how I feel it.

BN: Tell us about how you crafted songs for your latest album *Highs and Lows* and about your ongoing relationship with producer Jim Gaines.

BA: I do all my arrangements with my multitrack recorder at home. I put down a bass line, guitar line, keyboard parts, and click track, leaving the spots open for vocals. Then my bassist will come and listen to my bass line and puts his feel and ideas to the track. Jim Gaines is family, and he had a great relationship with my dad. We work very well together. It's pretty special and relaxed working with him.

BN: Your album *Highs and Lows,* recorded in 2022, was nominated for a Blues Music Award for Best Blues Rock Album. Are there any plans to get back into the studio soon?

BA: For the moment we have other projects coming this fall and next year. So, we will wait for our next studio album. But I have plenty of songs in the can when the time comes to record.

BN: It's obvious music fans love your playing. You've said you try to avoid overplaying on your recordings. What do you mean exactly?

BA: On my latest release *Highs and Lows* I really wanted to focus on good lyrics and arrangements. There's plenty of guitar on the album. I played what was needed to support each track. Performing live is different, I can stretch out and play a lot more. We try to make a show out of our live performances. I like to take the listeners on a dynamic roller coaster ride. LOL.

BN: Of all the cities in Europe, why Paris and when did you decide to make it home?

BA: My dad was living in Paris. He invited me to come over and record his live albums *Live in Berlin* and *More from Berlin*. During the rehearsals he realized how much I had advanced making arrangements and my guitar playing, etc. So, he asked me to stay and become his band leader. Which led me to stay and tour with him from 1989 -1992. After that I started my own group and began to record and tour under the name The Bernard Allison Group.

BN: How does it feel to be back touring in the U.S.?

BA: It's always good to play in our own country when the opportunity comes. Being a dominant European touring artist doesn't always allow us to perform consistently in the USA. And the success of my last three releases has drawn a lot of attention across the world. So, my management and agents search for the best options for my group.

BN: What would you consider the highlight of your career so far?

BA: I'd have to say playing with my dad for the first time at the Chicago Blues Festival at Navy Pier when I was 12 years old. A dream came true on stage with my dad.

BN: What kept you busy and how did you cope during the height of the Covid pandemic when audiences stayed home?

BA: I basically had the time to create *Highs & Lows* and get some much-needed down time as well.

BN: What do you think you would be doing if you weren't a musician?

BA: I most likely would have continued playing basketball. Other than that, I'd turn to professional bass fishing.

BN: How would you describe yourself as a musician in one sentence?

BA: A very open-minded, well-trained musician.

BN: What would you consider to be your greatest extravagance?

BA: Moving to Europe in 1989 and playing with my dad prior to starting my own career

BN: What do you consider your greatest achievement to date?

BA: Being the winner of two Independent Blues Awards for my Songs from The Road album, for Best Male Blues Artist & Best Live Recording.

BN: When and where were you happiest and what is your idea of perfect happiness?

BA: I'm pretty happy at the moment living in St Paul, Minnesota. Very relaxed & stress free.

BN: If you have a life motto, what is it?

BA: "Leave Your Ego-Play the Music-Love the People!" Luther Allison, the Allison way.

BN: If you were going to have a dinner party and could invite any four guests (living or dead), who would you invite and why?


BA: Bobby Rush, Stevie Ray Vaughan, Johnny Winter, Koko Taylor. They're all family and shaped me to where I am today musically.


music is. It is American roots music, born of the black and mixed race French-speaking Creoles of South Louisiana. It's exhilarating and as complex and diverse as the Creoles. It's also more than just one rhythm and one tempo. Sure, it's about dancing; "less dancing please", said no-one ever! But, it's also about grooving in place and dancing freely.

It's definitely about the vocal performance as well. Terrance's lead vocals and the stunning three-part harmonies of he, Danny and Stan - are proof positive that vocal performances matter - a lot!

Zydeco is dynamic and evolving - remaining relevant to allow its artists to express themselves within their genre without constraints. The late Dr. John, Terrance's friend/hero, once told him "If the music ain't changin, it's dvin."

Simien has become one of the most respected and accomplished artists in American roots music today. He and his band mates have performed over 10,000 concerts and toured millions of miles to over 45 countries during their eventful career. Their music has been placed in multiple theatre release films, including a Disney film, and TV and radio commercials. They've shared studio and stage with legends the Meters, Art Neville, Los Lobos, Marcia Ball, the late Robert Palmer and Dave Matthews Band, to name a few. They've been cultural ambassadors for their country since the mid 1980s as part of the U.S. State Department's ongoing cultural diplomacy tours. Halo Rider was an experience in a live electronic violin environment l've never seen in person. I've always loved Celtic violin (Celtic Woman) and this was not your grandparents' violin music!!! I was, as they say, BLOWN AWAY!

Halo Rider is: Markus James, vocals, cigar box guitar, slide guitar and banjo; Anne Harris, violin, vocals; Willy Jordan,

drums, percussion. The energy and audience interaction were a historical event. Why, you may ask?? Halo Rider's first appearance in Northern Cali. Yep, Mindy Giles, aka Swell Productions educating Sactown like no one else!!
