Plans are underway for the SBS's first foray back into the Blues Foundation's International Blues Challenge, after an absence of several years.




We extended the deadline for band registration from April 15 to April 30, and opened registration

Slide guitar great Roy Rogers opened the show for Bonnie with an acoustic set where he slayed us with his style and wardrobe of guitars as he sang songs we know and love by Robert Johnson, Willie Dixon and others, and shared stories about





being the "real" Roy Rogers. Roy was the perfect opener for Bonnie, two slide guitarists (are you kidding me???) and he had his share of fans in attendance as well. Interestingly, I spied Bonnie in the wings enjoying his set as he ended with "Living in the USA".

Bonnie took the stage to a standing ovation. The woman is an icon, there is nobody like her. I ran a gamut of emotions, with tears as she sang the beautiful and poignant "Just Like That" (for which she won the 2023 Song of the Year Grammy) but also her dedication of the song "Nick of Time"

to her late parents followed by a dedication to all of our parents. Yep, the tears were flowing.

Of course, Bonnie sang her many toe-tapping hits like "Let's Give Them Something to Talk About", "Thing Called Love", plus the two great songs written by her dear friend and talented songwriter, Bonnie Hayes, "Have a Heart" and "Love Letter." And yes, also "Angel From Montgomery" written by another icon, the late, great John Prine. I know there were weren't many dry eyes in the audience when she sang that classic.

Bonnie came back for an encore and took a stool in front of the microphone to sing "I Can't Make You Love Me" after which she confessed she often gets choked up when singing that song.

Bonnie ended the evening by calling Roy Rogers back to the stage to perform with her for a rousing finale.

I've loved Bonnie for almost half a century now. It was a happy, joyous, emotional, and moving evening with a very old friend. I hope she comes back to see us again soon

The concert lasted for nearly two hours, and it felt like it passed in



The band started out in the current Nightcats iteration, with Rick on



harmonica and vocals, Kid Andersen on guitar, Lorenzo Farrell on keys, Derrick "D'Mar" Martin on drums, plus Ronnie James Weber on bass. The songs they chose to play that night, according to Rick, all go back in Nightcats history, played with Charlie. They included cover songs that the band played "before we wrote our own songs", in Rick's own words. The band planned an evening of "guest stars" who had a special connection to Charlie. They brought out Texas guitar-slinger Anson

Kyle Rowland stepped onstage next, and Liz Peel Van Houten (another former Nightcat) subbed in on bass.





Funderburgh to join them on a number of songs. Spanish harp player/singer Quique Gómez, who was the last person to record with Charlie,

After intermission, guitarist/vocalist Rusty Zinn joined in, with another bass player, Randy Bermudes. Rusty sang a number of tunes, including a BB King song.

Combining these four talented musicians created a truly enjoyable, puton-yer-dancin' shoes evening that just didn't guit!



Upon meeting Vanessa after the show, it struck me how lovely a personality she is and genuinely shy and yet prepos-

sessing. She graciously spoke with each fan, giving full attention and interest in each. She is truly a genuine, caring human being, which is evidenced in her songwriting.

Vanessa is fast on her way up to winning many more music awards. She's been nominated seven different times for a Blues Music Award, capturing the BMA for Instrumental - Horn in 2019 as well as 2020. She is currently in the running for the 2023 Blues Music Award for Contemporary Blues Female Artist. Her colleagues competing with her are: Beth Hart, Janiva Magness, Ruthie Foster, and Teresa James. Tough stuff!

A Casual Conversation with Janiva Magness

The Blues Foundation named Janiva the B.B. King Entertainer of the Year in 2009, becoming only the second woman, after Koko Taylor, to be so honored. Not only is Janiva tremendously talented, she's also one of the nicest people I've ever had the opportunity to interview. I am a HUGE fan of both Janiva the artist, and Janiva the human being. I had the good fortune to attend her show at Goldfield Trading Post on March 16th. It was a hella fun evening and Janiva, with her band, put on one kick *ss show. And if you haven't heard her latest album Hard to Kill, you don't know what you're missing. Ladies and Gentlemen, meet Janiva Magness!



Blue Notes (BN): What inspired you to start singing?

Janiva Magness (JM): First and foremost, my father's singing and harp playing, then his record collection which was

a lot of early country like Hank Williams, Patsy Cline, Tex Ritter, and some early blues like Bullmoose Jackson and more. Great stuff!

BN: What was the role of music in the early years of your life?

JM: It was very important and everywhere, and I found memorizing melody and lyrics very easy as a young girl - which was great. So, I could sing along to records, TV and the radio!!

BN: How did you get your start in music?

JM: I always had the desire to sing. I mean a lot of people do and when we sing along to records, or commercials or theme songs, it's really fun right? So that turned into an obsession, a really good one, and that turned into a career path. So that desire certainly stayed with me and grew. I started auditioning for gigs with local bands and much to my surprise I would get the gigs for the most part. I was shocked but happy. It seems early on others thought I could really sing and gave me a chance. I was lucky and I have also worked very hard - good combo!

BN: If you hadn't become a musician/singer, what do you think you would be doing now?

JM: Hard to say because music has been a real-life raft for me. I am not sure I would have survived without it honestly. But if I did, a therapist, or a lawyer – IF I could tolerate school, which has always been a challenge for me.

BN: Who have been your biggest musical influences?

JM: Easily my dad, Koko Taylor, Etta James, Bob Tate, Bonnie Raitt, James Brown, Billie Holiday, Joni Mitchell, and Dave Darling my collaborator, producer, and dear friend.

BN: Do you have a favorite song to perform and why?

JM: Favorite songs change over time for me. Right now, it's the material from my latest release Hard to Kill. Especially "Strong as Steel", "Fireman", "Right Here" and "Closer".

BN: What musician would you most like to collaborate with?

JM: My producer and song collaborator Dave Darling.

BN: What are you most excited about in your life right now?

JM: I am in development right now for my memoir Weeds Like Us

to be turned into a screenplay for television – a limited series. That's pretty exciting, surreal and a bit scary!

BN: What has been the highlight of your career so far?

JM: I gotta say there have been a LOT of highlights. First and most importantly is the connection with the audience when we do a live show. It's palpable and wonderful. And I gotta say the night I heard B.B. King call my name as the "B.B. King Entertainer of the Year" in Memphis - was second to none. Getting recognition from the Blues Foundation for my songwriting has been stunning. Certainly, the multiple BMA nominations and several wins and of course, the Grammy nomination. So, like I said there have been quite a few...

BN: What are some of the challenges unique to being a woman in the music industry and blues world?

JM: There are plenty of challenges to being a musician today regardless of gender identification. The music business is constantly changing. Some parts of the business of music are quite heavily slanted towards men. That's nothing new and even though it's been brought more to the forefront in the last several years, we still need a lot more balance.

Talent buyers, as they are referred to today, need a system to help them determine who to book and still stay current with what's happening in the business AND draw fans AND stay in business. It's a hard balancing act. Artists need to figure out some similar things and more - in order to stay in business and relevant, also a very hard balancing act and the infrastructure is basically set against artists making money. Costs for artists to be on tour have wildly escalated post-pandemic but their pay rate has not necessarily gone up. It's all very challenging.

For women specifically, one example being, there is a sort of practice of fulfilling **quotas** for talent tuyers who book shows, and one of those quotas is for women. It's not unusual for a talent tuyer to say, "well I need a woman" or "I already have my slot filled for a woman on the festival". So unfortunately, that practice leaves a lot out – ultimately for the audience. So, another female fronted act may not have a shot on the billing "because the quota is filled...". What I see is very little consciousness about this, and there are multiple spots allotted for other types of players, who are primarily male. It's weird and distorted from my point of view and a long-time, widely accepted practice. So, in this example, women have to deal with a lot fewer options of where and when to try and work.I don't see that changing until the audience demands it, frankly. I don't really get upset about these things any longer, as much as it bores me. No one ever said being a musician will be easy – ever!

My personality is such that having a mountain in my way has never been much of a deterrent. If I allow that to stop me - I will get nowhere as an artist or woman in business. For me, it then became almost a discipline about going around it, going through it or over the obstacle! I also learned long ago that if someone has a problem with me because of my gender, it's their problem and not mine. At least I try to not let it be mine. It also helps to not take things so personally, even if they are intended to be!

One pointed example of that was, I was backstage at a festival some years ago and it had been a stressful travel day and things were intense backstage with trying to get set up and get on stage on time etc. We were all treading carefully as we knew the overall vibe was tense and we just wanted to get our job done. I asked for a power strip so I could quickly fix my hair since it was super hot and humid that day. I was eventually given the power strip and my road manager was immediately told by the buyer "I will never work with her again - NEVER!" As far as I could find out, it was because I asked for the power strip. (BTW that has proven to be the case. Have not worked with that buyer ever since.) It's kinda wild and I can't help but wonder if a male musician had asked for a power strip if they would have been "blacklisted" or labeled "difficult" for their request ...? It is important for me to say that I don't see myself or women in general as victims here. Most women I know in music are pretty tough and savvy. We have to be. Do we have "extra" challenges in the business? I tend to think so, based on my experience. Do I let it stop me or push me off my goals? Have not done so yet and have no plans to, for the future. I am sure there are many more stories I can tell, but that in and of itself is an entire article, worthy of its own headline. The problems and solutions to the difficult slant of the music business!

BN: Is there anything special you do to prepare your voice for a gig?

JM: Yes! Always, specific warm up routine along with steam. Dietary restrictions and more. It's a big commitment to keep in vocal shape.

BN: How do you feel about touring? Do you enjoy it?

JM: I love being on tour because it's a sort of singleness of purpose. My band is an amazing group of musicians and excellent humans so it's super fun and we all know that we have each others' backs to get through the challenges that touring often brings. It's a great experience and we get to play music and connect with the fans. Beautiful!

BN: If you could have your fans remember one thing about you, what would it be?

JM: I truly love them and am so grateful to see them again!

BN: What do you consider your biggest achievement to date?

JM: That I am living my best life – I'm still here – Just like the song lyrics say!!

BN: You laid your entire life "out there" in your book *Weeds Like Us.* What was your inspiration for writing such an honest memoir, and did you find the experience to be cathartic?

JM: Weeds Like Us is a true story. It is my true story and I have long known I needed to write it - but I really didn't want to. I also talk about this in the beginning of the book. I just didn't think it was "anybody's business". But when I came to realize it by sharing my story - it could serve as a way to really help other people who have struggled with their lives, young people, and adults - that changed my thinking. I actually had witnessed that very thing – helping others understand their early struggles or current ones are not the end of the story!!! I witnessed this for many years as a Mentor for Youth-At-Risk and connecting with other foster care alumni - and doing public speaking engagements about my experiences, so I knew what I had to do and yes, it was a difficult and cathartic process. Six years in the writing and a lifetime in the making. BTW - that has turned out to be very true. I know it's a hard read in the first half, it was a hard part of my life. But that part of my life no longer defines me -and THAT is the point, isn't it? I really am living my best life now and it ain't perfect but it's exceptional! I believe we all have access to that kind of life if we are willing to work for it and not give up.

BN: As a silver-haired sister, I have to say that I love your new look. The silver/white hair is gorgeous on you. What inspired you to go from brunette to beautiful silver-haired songstress?

JM: Ahhh I have been a brunette my whole life! My hair color change is one of the results of the pandemic (like a lot of us) and it really grows fast! I do kinda miss it, but I am not willing to do all that again. I got tired of the touch up process and reconciled myself to the platinum. I am grateful I don't have to do THAT work any longer. As long as I can have a fresh haircut – I'm good and I am glad u dig it – Yours is gorgeous my dear! I do see a LOT more women who have done the same – I think it's fabulous!!

BN: What is the funniest/weirdest question you've ever been asked in an interview?

JM: I honestly have no idea....!!! I probably blocked it out' because it was so weird!!!

BN: If you have a life motto, what is it?

JM: Ha! When a door slams, remember that a window opens... Meantime it can be hell in the hallway!! Just hang on!

BN: What poster, if any, did you have on your wall growing up?

JM: Franco Zeffirelli's *Romeo and Juliet*. Later it was John Hammond, Jr., Taj Mahal, and Billie Holiday!

BN: If you were to have a dinner party and could invite any four guests (living or dead), who would you invite?

JM: My dad. Koko Taylor. My brother Jimmie and my last foster mother Carrie.

BN: If you could snap your fingers and change anything in the world, what would it be?

JM: People being more compassionate towards each other. I think it could solve many of our world's problems. Practice more loving kindness.

CD Review Vanessa Collier - Heart on the Line

Phenix Fire Records By Cari Chenkin

This is an embarrassing admission to make, but here it is – I found this CD in a box of magazines in my living room a couple of weeks ago, and I don't know how long it had been there. Since the CD came out in 2020, it's got to have been a couple of years! I guess it came to the SBS mailbox and was given to me to review for the



newsletter, and I must've put it down absent-mindedly and forgotten about it.

Lo and behold, it's now 2023, Vanessa Collier comes to town to play a Blues & Bourbon show in March, and the CD magically popped up when I cleaned out my magazine stash! So, since it's still her most recent studio CD (she released a live CD in 2022) I thought it would bear reviewing in this issue of the *Blue Notes*.

Self-produced by Ms. Collier, this 11-song CD is truly a gem! She wrote all but three of the songs on the album, and it really show-cases what a "triple threat" she is – as a songwriter, singer and saxophone player.

Her band on this album consists of the blazing Laura Chavez on guitar, William Gorman on keys and clarinet, Nick Stevens on drums, percussion and something called a Shuitar, which I'd never heard of. (Pronounced "Shih-tar", turns out this is a "shitty" guitar that's been repurposed as a percussion instrument - check it out on You Tube!) Bass duties on this recording are handled by C. C. Ellis, Scot Sutherland and Cornell Williams, each performing on different cuts. Quinn Carson played trombone and Doug Woolverton played trumpet. Vanessa Collier provided vocals, background vocals; alto, tenor and baritone saxophones as well as resonator guitar on track number three (which I'll get to in a moment) and cowbell.

The album starts off with a rousing and completely badass, soulful version of James Brown's "Super Bad". Then it moves into a Vanessa Collier composition called "What Makes You Beautiful", which immediately became my very favorite cut on the CD. It had an almost Motown-like quality and melodic feeling that really captivated me. The next cut, titled "Bloodhound" was a real old-style, downhome blues that you'd swear came out of Mississippi in the 1930s but is another Vanessa Collier original, and she completely does it justice on the resonator. Amazing!

Next comes a song called "I Don't Want Anything to Change", a sweet and plaintive ballad written by Elisabeth Wagner Rose, Maia Sharp and Stephanie Chapman. Cut number four is a terrific rendition of the classic Randy Newman tune "You Can Leave Your Hat On", one of my favorites from his catalog. The rest of the album consists of all Vanessa Collier originals including "If Only" which was a great "message song" and the slow blues grind of "Weep and Moan" which had a "St. Louis Blues" type of feeling. The CD closes with the title track "Heart on the Line".

I thoroughly enjoyed this entire CD and it will become part of my regular rotation of what I'm listening to these days. I look forward to hearing her *Live at the Power Station* CD and any new studio albums she cuts. Visit Vanessa's website at: www.vanessacollier.com.
