My cousin, Barbara, has been calling me the "Ticket Whisperer" for a while now, and I've been asked to share some of the tricks on how I am able to often get great seats to concerts. When it is a show, you REALLY want to go to, you need a plan on how you will be able to get good seats without paying the resell cost.

First, I recommend you follow your favorite artists on social media and periodically check their website for tour announcements. Once you know or hear your favorite artist or band is going out on tour, you need to start watching for dates. Join their fan club (most of them are free nowadays), which in turn will give you that much needed pre-sale code. You can also search the web and sometimes find them. But why worry about that when the fan club will usually send them to you?

So now you have the date (and friends you are going with), and you have a mission to get the best tickets you can. The day the presale tickets are scheduled to go on sale, log into the ticket seller webpage ahead of time to make sure the site is working and read the information to see if there might be special instructions to follow.

Once on the site, to set it up, all you must do is add the pre-sale code and when it lets you in, choose your tickets! And just so you know, good seats and many tickets costs \$\$\$...so be prepared and know your spending limit.

Recently, the news has been reporting a trend of items being thrown up on stage at Artists. It's apparent that some audiences need to be

reminded of concert etiquette. Emily Post and even *Rolling Stone* magazine have published standards of concert etiquette. So dear blues buddies, that will be the subject of my next President's Message. Until then, I hope to see you at the next musical event!



What's The News with Biscuits & Blues?

Recently I came upon a social media post from Biscuits & Blues, asking if anyone could guess the Grand Re-opening date. This put a bee in my bonnet, as I have been eagerly awaiting the reopening of San Francisco's preeminent blues music venue (since 1995).

Many of us know the venue had to close unexpectedly in April 2019 when the upstairs

business developed a rather nasty leak which rained down onto Biscuits and Blues below. Because of the unsanitary conditions, the club was unable to stay open. However, the restaurant business above it remained open 24 hours a day while the case was being fought in court. Biscuits & Blues ultimately prevailed after a long, protracted court case.

Steven Suen, owner of Biscuits & Blues, was recently contacted for an update. He responded: "At this time, I am still getting feedback



from my contractor as he explores the timeline for the remodel project. The upstairs business's contractors are visiting our space trying to work on their part of repair. Once done, my contractor will have a better idea what's coming up next. That's all I know for now. I'm hopeful the grand re-opening will be before the holidays. Meanwhile, I am looking forward to Biscuits & Blues 2.0 as it will serve our community in the greater Bay Area for the next 15 to 20 years, at least. How about a Biscuits & Blues in Sacramento? Just a thought."

It's really going to happen, with luck and perseverance. We're all looking forward to their re-opening. Something to think about: a Biscuit & Blues club in Sacramento??? Yes, please!

The Night I Met The Blues

It happened on January 25, 1968, at The Coconut Grove Ballroom on Franklin Blvd./Fruitridge Avenue.

The show was Junior Wells and his South Chicago Blues Band. I knew nothing of Junior Wells, nor did the crowd of some eighty Black folks who came to check him out.

Junior Wells started playing his signature songs—"Hoodoo Man Blues," and "Checking On My Baby." There was no clapping, no finger popping, and no one was dancing. The audience was just watching. Junior noticed this and went to the microphone and said this: "What's the matter folks, aren't I playing anything you like?"

The audience responded with "Motown!" First it was "Stevie Wonder!" Then, "The Temptations! Martha & The Vandellas!"

Junior got mad. He grabbed the microphone and said this: "I'm Junior Wells and I play THE BLUES, and I don't care if you like it or not."

The room went silent. The entire audience turned and walked out and got their money back. I was the only person left. And they played a complete set for me. I met Junior and the band. We became friends for his whole career.

Through the years, one time, I asked him

if he remembered that night long ago in Sacramento. "Yes, Jay—that was the weekend I didn't get paid."

June 25, 2023 - The NJR Trio

The NJR Trio was our member band for Blue Sunday on 6/26. This marked the first time we had an **all-acoustic** show for Blue Sunday, and it was a fun and refreshing change of pace. Despite being



acoustic (yes, they were amplified via the PA system) the band put out a nicely rounded and large sound.

Fronted by Nedra Russ on vocals and harmonica, the rest of the band consisted of Julio Guerra (sometimes known

as "Julio InGlasses", LOL) on guitar and vocals and Jay Crawford on upright bass. One thing I've seldom seen at a blues show, was Jay's use of a bow on some songs, in addition to the usual plucking.

The band played a combina-



tion of classic blues tunes and some originals as well. Songs included "Walking Shoes", "Mean Woman Blues", "Blues Is My Business", "Mellow Down Easy", "Got My Mojo Workin" and "Pride and Joy". They even played a couple of unconventional covers, including a Kate Wolf tune and Bob Dylan's "From a Buick 6".

They drew a respectable-sized crowd and



both the band and attendees enjoyed the afternoon.

July 30, 2023 - The Dave Earl Blues Band

Our July Blue Sunday featured The Dave Earl Blues Band. Dave is a wellknown musician who's played with many big-name blues perform-



ers throughout the years, and his knowledge of the genre and his ease and skill as a guitarist, singer and harmonica player really shone throughout the show.

Dave (guitar, vocals, harmonica) was joined onstage by Brett Cole on bass, Artie Chavez on drums

and Sid Morris on keyboards. They played a great mix of original tunes and classic blues songs, covering artists like Howling Wolf,

Jimmy Reed, Otis Spann and Slim Harpo. Slim was one of Dave's inspirations in the blues, so much so that he wrote a song about him called "Slim Harpo", which the band performed.

Notable covers included "Who's Been Talkin", "Take Out Some Insurance", "Hip Shake", "King Bee", "Shake Your Money Maker", "Talk to Your Daughter" and the Albert

King hit "I'll Play the Blues for You", which coincidentally is the title of Dave's newest CD.

Angel Reyes

Angel Reyes was born and raised in Sacramento, CA. His maternal grandfather and uncle both played guitars, singing and playing Mexican folk songs. Angel said, "As far back as I can remember, there has always been a guitar". His early influences were the three Kings, B.B., Albert, and Freddy in addition to Earl King, Jr. Angel is mostly self-taught with lessons early on in his development from Tiny Moore's music teacher, Skip Majora, and



later, Mark Peirson from The Working Class band.

Angel was the featured guitarist with R&B singer Sylvester in the early seventies in San Francisco, first with his group Sylvester and the Hot Band, later forming another musical troupe which added vocalist Bianca Thorton, aka "Lady Bianca". This band became very popular, having sell-out crowds every night at their regular gig at the Cabaret Club, and playing the Whiskey A Go-Go in December of 1974 in Los Angeles and San Francisco's California Hall, headlining over Dan Hicks and His Hot Licks.

Angel has a long list of playing blues with some of the greatest. He toured extensively throughout the Midwest, Canada, and the Pacific Northwest Regions with recording artists the Francisco Bros. Angel has played with blues singer and Hammond organist Glenn Lane and the Soul of the Blues. For twelve years ending in December 2016, he played with Willie G and has played the Monterey Blues Festival backing up Delta guitar player Guitar Mac. With Mac he also has played the Mount Shasta Blues Festival and the California State Fair. Angel was featured in Vol. 3, Issue 6, Jan/Feb 2000 of the Official Jimi Hendrix magazine, *Experience Hendrix*. He has also played at Eli's in Oakland, benefiting Sonny Rhodes, the Texas slide guitarist whose touring van caught fire while on tour in Florida.

Angel is currently doing session work and live performances with his own band, The Angel Reyes Band, with members guitarist Tim Barnes, Dwayne O'Neal on bass, and Rat-a-Tat Pat Balcom on drums.

Beth Reid-Grigsby

Born and raised in Santa Barbara, and influenced by her family's love of the blues, Beth Reid-Grigsby had her first singing appearance on stage at the Bluebird Café in Santa Barbara in 1977.

She and husband RW Grigsby, bass player and HOF inductee 2018, moved to Sacramento in 1992, where Beth photographed several local artists, including The Hucklebucks and Screaming Dave Wright and Serious Trouble, creating album covers for



both in the mid to late 90s. She photographed every one of Mark Hummel's Blues Harmonica Blowouts from 2007 forward as well as two Blues Cruises and many road shows.

Beth started singing locally in 2002, mostly sitting in with such bands as The Hucklebucks and Johnny Guitar Knox, including performing with Johnny at the Sacramento Jazz Jubilee and various others. She sang in, booked, and managed the Keri Carr band for three years, singing backup and performing in the Sacramento region.

Beth started her band Red's Blues in 2012 with the idea of featuring a special guest artist at each show. Their first show featured Aki Kumar at the legendary Torch Club in Sacramento. Red's Blues has performed at the Sacramento Music Festival, the Cajun & Blues Festival, and continues to perform at the Torch Club and the "Blues & Bourbon" series at the Starlet in Sacramento, along with many others in the region as one of the most popular local bands. Red's Blues has been nominated twice for the Sammies Awards, an awards program in Sacramento that recognizes local talent, and they have produced three successful CDs.

As a teacher and performer, Beth has given her talents to the SBS Blues In The Schools (BITS) program in 2022-2023 and has become a regular. According to the program director "the kids love her".

As songwriter, lead singer, front woman, manager and booking agent for Red's Blues, Beth contributes significantly to our local blues community

Frank Dupree

Frank Dupree, born and raised in Knox-ville, TN, left home at 17 to join the military. Music was always at the forefront of his life even when there wasn't anything to be found on the radio.

Frank played piano in the church and learned all he could by his own means – records provided his music education, Jimmy Smith in particular. While stationed in Honolulu, Frank had access to an organ at the YWCA in 1967, still self-taught, and



went on to earn an AA degree in music theory and composition. While in Hawaii, he drew from the local talent – Don Ho, Arthur Lyman, and Boby Lester.

Upon being discharged from the military at Mather Air Base in 1970, Frank decided to stay in Sacramento and established his first band there, a trio called The Operators, which got him through a two-year course in nursing school. Many players would come and go in this trio but the main players were Rich Yarison, drums and James

Olsen (deceased) guitar and sax, playing at the Tia Maria, Crow's Nest, Los Robles, Ramada Inn and other places Following this trio, Frank formed another band called The Mid-day Moon in 1977, again with many players coming and going, but John Lamiell on sax and JJ Funderburk (deceased) were key players, as they continued to play at various Sacramento locations that no longer exist. They were also featured in the *Living Blues* magazine Vol #74.

Frank played on the road with Bobby Bland for a bit, starting on the East Coast and ending in San Carlos at the legendary Circle Star Theater. He opened shows for B.B. King, Ramsey Lewis, and Ben E. King, and played with Lou Rawls, Nancy Wilson, Merl Saunders, and Buddy Ace

Frank states "My sincerest appreciation of the blues happened as I migrated to the band playing with John Heartsman (HOF 2008). There was a pulse to my music I had not explored yet and thanks to John, I was able to do this." They played together for several years at venues like the Monterey Blues Festival, Harrah's Tahoe, the San Francisco Blues Festival, and the infamous Sam's Hof Brau...and the list goes on.

Jeff Hughson

A stalwart of the Sacramento music scene for many years, Jeff Hughson is recognized for his role in creating the Sacramento Blues Society along with Mick Martin and Phil Givant. It was in 1979 at the Sacramento Blues Festival that producer Phil Givant, Mick Martin & Jeff asked the attendees who would be interested in establishing a Blues Society. Many signed up and the first meeting was held shortly after, at which time Jeff was elected President



Long before this, he was a record collector for many years, and his extensive collection of LPs includes the likes of Little Jimmy Reed, Muddy Waters, Bo Diddley, John Lee Hooker, and many more well-known blues artists. He recounts how he would go to Tower Records and buy these now collector's items for only a few dollars! This led to new experiences of being a DJ on the radio.

He was a sixteen-year-old high school student doing the 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. show on KXRQ (FM) weekdays, in addition to his Sunday morning blues show. Later, when he heard the station was being sold, he interviewed with the new owner and became a co-founder (his record collection became much of the station library!) and the first Music Director of the new station, now called KZAP. "I graduated from (Sacramento) High School in June of 1968, and I went to work at the end of July." One of the first free-form radio stations in America, the now-legendary KZAP is the central touchstone in an upcoming film documentary, *Free-Form, Baby!*. Jeff is the Executive Producer of this film.

Collecting, learning, and research continued, and his knowledge and production skills expanded.

Many of the blues shows in Sacramento were produced by Jeff on behalf of the SBS, including outdoor events in William Land Park and at various venues around town. Tootsie's in Old Sacramento was a favorite where admission was only three dollars most times and featured local bands along with big name blues artists like The Robert Cray Band with Curtis Salgado, Charlie Musselwhite, Luther Tucker, and others. Shows were held there two times a week and in all Jeff's tenure more than 40 concerts were produced.


Since 1982, her musical efforts have centered around Sacramento and Northern California, subsequently becoming a



major female voice in the Sacramento blues music scene. In 2005, she began hosting local blues jams with her band and in 2008 she traveled to Memphis with guitarist Ron Cook to represent the Sacramento Blues Society in the International Blues Challenge, a Blues Foundation event open to the best musicians world-wide. Pinkie also gives her talent and time to the SBS Blues in the Schools program, where she has become a favorite with students and teachers alike at school assemblies.

Pinkie is not only a talented blues musician/vocalist but a writer, producer, and philanthropist. Having dealt bravely with her own personal medical issues, she is a constant voice in the effort to help those that need a hand. One of Pinkie's rules for performing in her band is the willingness to perform at benefit and charity gigs. Because, with a grin, Pinkie said "It keeps ya legal!"

Over the past two decades, Pinkie has performed with and opened for numerous artists, a few of whom include Bobby Bland, Mavis Staples, Betty LaVette, Bonnie Raitt, Dave Mason, Kim Wilson, Bruce Willis, Ronnie Montrose, Chris Cain, and others. She joined the Mick Martin Big Blues Band, to perform, along with other local musicians, a *History of the Blues* stage production written by Nan Mahon.

Blues and Bones Festival Featuring the Blood Brothers



might be like and I'm ready to go!



Christone "Kingfish" Ingram

This guy can sing!!! I first heard "Kingfish" sing on a Blues Cruise in 2021 as the world started venturing out from the pandemic lockdown. From the very first word he sang, he had me. His voice is so smooth, sultry, and mesmerizing. This show was more of the same; like being enveloped in the lull of a blues cloud.

"Kingfish" opened with his breakout hit "Fresh Out." This composition really demonstrates the breadth of his guitar

skills. He makes his guitar sing, talk, cry, wail, sway, whisper, howl, scream, and I even heard tap dancing as he thumped on the neck strings!

Christone was born into music. His mother was Princess Pride, cousin of country legend Charley Pride. Born and raised in Clarkdale, Mississippi, he was surrounded by and instructed in the blues culture. Major blues influencers were Robert Johnson, Buddy Guy, Lightnin' Hopkins, BB King, and Muddy Waters. And with admiration for Jimi Hendrix and Prince, "Kingfish" can really rock the blues.


As have most artists, Christone has had good times and bad. But it is his extraordinary talent that has translated these experiences into works of art that even at a young age, marked him as a blues prodigy. Kingfish has become the "defining blues voice of his generation" (as stated on his bio on Alligator Records).

It would take at least two pages of small-font single space to list all of his awards. Just to mention a few. in 2020, his debut album *King*-

fish won five Blues Music Awards including Album of the Year. His sophomore album 662 was released in 2021 and won a Grammy for Best Contemporary Blues Album, and in 2023 Christone "Kingfish" Ingram wont Contemporary Blues Male Artist of the year at the Blues Music Awards.

"Kingfish" has already had multiple TV appearances, toured with Buddy Guy, and performed at the White House for First Lady Michelle Obama.

Christone closed the show with Grammy winning and fan favorite "662". Everyone was on their feet, dancing and singing along. So much already accomplished, yet so much more to come from a young man who is only 24 years old!



Alabama Mike at The Starlet

If Alabama Mike's show at the Starlet had been an episode of Sesame Street, it would have been brought to you by the letters "S" and "I". But rollicking and occasionally ribald as it was, this "Blues and Bourbon" sshow was definitely meant more for adults than any episode of Sesame Street ever thought of being.

Alabama Mike brought his band, the Mighty Revelators, up to Sacramento where they proceeded to bring the house down. With Bobby "Chief" Young on guitar, AJ Joyce

on bass, Lorenzo Hawkins on keyboards, Bernard "Dr. B" Anderson

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on saxophone, and Ronnie "Deep Pocket" Smith on drums, the band ripped, tore, shredded and grooved through fan favorites old and new. Newly returned from an extended tour in Brazil, Alabama Mike's performance on harmonica and vocals kept the large and enthusiastic crowd entertained from start to finish.



Having released his newest CD, Stuff I've Been Through, less than two months prior to the show, as well as having his previously issued material to

draw from, Mike filled the evening with mostly original tunes. He



started off with a song drawn from personal experiences regarding a woman from Arkansas. He then rolled right into an original from the new album entitled "SSI Blues," a somewhat tonguein-cheek and yet thought-provoking song entitled with an acronym which his mother apparently wasn't familiar

with as, per Alabama Mike's telling, he earned high praise from her when he revealed that he had received his first SSI check in the mail.

Other vocal highlights of the evening's performance included a rendition of "Ain't Gonna Let You Fat Shame Me," his smash hit off his latest album. Many in the crowd appeared to already know the lyrics to this song, and Mike encouraged those that didn't to at least join in on the choruses, until the whole room was singing along enthusiasti-



cally. Continuing with the singalong theme, Mike introduced a song which, according to him, required audience participation. Using the common A-B-A-B rhyming pattern, Mike would sing nearly an entire verse and then call upon the audience to complete the stanza with a rhyming word or phrase. Based upon the leading language of the

ing elicited roars of mirth from everybody watching.

Alabama Mike kept the crowd enthralled not only with his songs, but also with his stories. Witty, funny, and occasionally poignant, but always relevant, Mike's stories gave the background behind many of his original tunes that he performed that evening. After leaving the

stage to allow his group of outstanding backing musicians to shine by performing an extended instrumental tune, Mike returned to lead

the crowd in one final singalong song, his ever-popular "M-I-S-S-I-S-S-I-P-P-I." At its conclusion, he left the stage to thunderous applause and a standing ovation by many.

This performance is




one of the most memorable shows of the year in the "Blues and

comfort only equaled in Las Vegas.




